- 4. **Confidentiality and Informed Consent**: Understand the importance of maintaining confidentiality while also recognizing situations where informed consent and mandated reporting are necessary.
- 5. **Boundary Management**: Learn how to establish and maintain appropriate professional boundaries with clients, colleagues, and other stakeholders to ensure ethical practice.
- 6. **Client Rights and Self-Determination**: Respect and uphold the rights of clients, including their right to self-determination, participation in the decision-making process, and the pursuit of their best interests.
- 7. **Accountability and Supervision**: Understand the importance of professional accountability and the role of supervision in ensuring ethical practice, self-reflection, and ongoing growth.
